


### **Impact Report**

EMBracing the Ocean artist-in-residence project Reporting period April 2023 - August 2024

"I really liked the film as it represents the beauty of the lagoon and port environment, but highlighting the anthropic disturbance and degradation of habitats. **Co-design process:** Artist Sonia Levy delivered this project in collaboration with <u>Alberto Barausse</u> (<u>Stazione Idrobiologica Umberto d'Ancona</u>, University of Padova, Italy) and curator <u>Chiara Famengo</u> with the support of <u>TBA21 Academy</u>. The project aimed to shed light on the the socioecological dynamics of the Venice Lagoon, particularly focusing on the impact of its industrialisation and the construction of petrochemical refineries. This topic was explored through discussions with scientists and artisan fishers. The goal was to enhance public understanding of the damage to the ecosystem and its causes, and to engage stakeholders in efforts to restore and protect the lagoon. Sonia undertood two 'residency' periods at Stazione Idrobiologica Umberto d'Ancona, the first to collect video material during field trips guided by scientific collaborators, and the second to conduct participatory workshops with fishers, scientists, humanities scholars, local stakeholders, artists and architects.

#### **Project outputs:**

- Creation of film "We Marry You, O Sea, as a Sign of True and Perpetual Dominion", aiming to shed light on Venice's submerged histories and altered biogeomorphologies, offering a rare glimpse of the Lagoon from an immersed perspective. The film integrates underwater footage with rarely-seen archival images capturing the industrialisation of the Lagoon.
- Development of an original choir piece to emulate the Lagoon's underwater environment and communicate socio-ecological narratives, combined with sound recordings of the Lagoon, as a soundtrack to the film. Developed in collaboration with conductor <u>Esmeralda Conde Ruiz</u> and the <u>E ensemble</u> international group of singers.
- Premier of film at <u>Cinema Galleggiante</u> Floating Cinema, Venice, 1 September 2023.
- Film screenings and discussions at Spiazzi, Venice, during <u>Unruly Nature</u> workshop (26 January 2024); <u>Palazzo Grassi</u>, Chioggia (29 February 2024); <u>Royal College of Art</u>, London (6 March 2024); <u>Goldsmiths University</u>, London (14 March 2024); <u>Art Explora Festival</u>, Venice (20 April 2024); <u>Riga Pasaules Film Festival</u> (26 April 2024).
- Presentation of aspects of the film and workshops to researchers as part of a guided boat tour of the Venice Lagoon during the <u>Unruly Nature programme</u>, 24-26 January 2024.
- Presentation of the project at <u>Morecambe Milieux</u>, <u>Aqueous Futures</u> event, Lancaster University (6-7 September 2023); <u>Tributaries:</u> <u>Reflections of Art and Water</u> event, London Metropolitan University (4 October 2023); <u>TU Delft</u>, The Netherlands (April 2024).
- Discussion of project during panel discussion of <u>EurOcean</u>, Vigo, Spain (10-11 October 2023);
- Development of a two-channel installation with surround sound version of the film, shown at "<u>Liquid Intelligence</u>" exhibition at Museo Nacional Thyssen-Bornemisza, Madrid, 9 October 2023-28 January 2024, curated by TBA21 affiliates Chus Martínez, Soledad Gutiérrez and María Montero Sierra.
- Commissioned text "Becoming Lagoon Literate" written by Karin Ingersoll to accompany the exhibition of the film, focusing on shifting focus from land- to ocean- centric perspectives.
- Four <u>participatory workshops</u> at Stazione Idroboiologica Umberto D'Ancona, led by Sonia Levy and facilitated by Chiara Femengo. These provided a platform for interdisciplinary dialogue and knowledge exchange between scientists from various disciplines, humanities scholars, local residents, artists, architects and artisanal fishers towards sustainable solutions to issues impacting the Lagoon. The film served as a tool for discussion and engagement.

#### **Key impact:**

- Raising awareness of issues facing the Venice Lagoon by engaging diverse audiences locally and internationally from art, academia, local fishermen and the general public.
- Advancing transformative and art-science collaborative approaches towards developing solutions for sustainable development.

#### **Project longevity:**

- Continuation of collaborations established during the project e.g. with researchers at Stazione Umberto d'Ancona looking at cuttlefish survival and erosion mitigation.
- Creation of "How Like a Reef" website to cultivate and showcase the collaborative parterships and methods established during the project, and to foster new partnerships for interdisciplinary collaboration.
- Establishment of international network of practitioners working on Ocean challenges through interdisciplinary collaboration, together with <a href="Chiara Certom\alpha">Chiara Certom\alpha</a> (University Sapienze, Rome) and the <a href="SAp&O">SAp&O</a> initiative.
- Organisation of seminars and meetings with environmental humanities researchers from the <u>NICHE</u> (Centre for Environmental Humanities, Ca'Foscari University, Venice) network aiming to cultivate new alliances for future impact of the work.
- Sonia is a member of the Steering Committee at the <u>UN Ocean Decade Coordination Office on Connecting People and the Ocean.</u>

"The organizers were capable to weave the insiders and outsiders experiences, perceptions and values to frame the peculiar lagoon socio-ecologies as a co-produced 'hydrocitizenship'.
